Southside Landing getting life jacket loaner station

Boaters in Southside will soon be safer after a commitment from the National Boating Safety Council's to build a life jacket loaner station.

The non-profit organization is set to install the station at Southside Landing in spring of 2025. The station is being erected in honor of Chris Day, a champion of water safety and a resident of Southside who passed away.

"Chris Day wanted to bring a loaner station to Southside," said Michael Weldon, Southside Parks and Recreation supervisor. "It's pretty special that they are recognizing him in this. Chris was a very wellliked guy in the city. He always attended our city events, and he always helped out."

The National Boating Safety Council will foot the bill of the project as well as life jackets.

"The Boating Safety Council will replace any damaged or missing ones at no cost to the city," Weldon said.

The loaner station will have displays on how to properly use the life jackets available. The station will include a range of sizes of life jackets. "It will be there to use, if needed," Wel-

don said. "So, if you're going on your friend's boat and need a life jacket, there will be some there." The station will boast the city's logo as well as the safety council's logo when it is

"The loaner station won't be like those bike shares or anything like it," Weldon

said. "It will just be there if you need it." According to Alabama safe boating laws, everyone on board a vessel must have a life jacket available to them. Anyone being towed on skis or a tube, riding

feet below a dam must wear a life jacket. Children under eight years old are required to wear a life jacket at all times while on a boat or aquatic vessel.

"No person shall operate or give permission to operate any vessel on the waters of this state towing a person or persons on water skis, surfboard, spinners, or other similar devices unless such person or persons being towed are wearing a U.S. Coast Guard-approved wearable 'Performance Level' PFD [personal floatation device] approved for the specific activity an older style Type I, II, III, or Type V U.S. Coast Guard-approved PFD which is in good, serviceable condition and is approved for the specific activity," the law states.

According to Alabama Law Enforcement Agency's Marine Patrol Division, "all boats must be equipped with "U.S. Coast Guard-approved wearable life jackets called personal flotation devices or each person on board and/or being towed. Each wearable PFD must be in good condition, the proper size for the intended wearer and, very importantly, must be readily accessible. Readily accessible means you must be able to put the PFD on in a reasonable amount of time in an emergency (boat sinking, on fire, etc.). PFDs should not be stowed in plastic bags, in locked or closed compartments, or have other gear stowed on top of them.

Statistics on boating and waterway safety show that 79 percent of recorded boating accident victims were not wearing life jackets at the time of their fatal accidents. According to statistics from 2022, the total number of accidents declined by 15.7 percent, and the number of non-fatal injured victims declined by 17.2 percent. But the number of fatalities increased by 8.5 percent. According to the same statistics provided, 81 percent of fatal boating accident

Gov. Ivey's office awards grants to local non-profits

Governor Kay Ivey recently awarded \$2.6 million to assist Alabamians who are homeless or in jeopardy of becoming homeless.

United Way of East Central Alabama, which serves Etowah, Calhoun, Cherokee and DeKalb counties, re-

ceived \$250,000 to provide emergency shelter and homeless prevention. 2nd Chance, which serves Etowah, Calhoun, Cleburne and Talladega counties, received \$150,000 to provide emergency shelter and rapid rehousing assistance to

domestic violence victims.

The grants were awarded to 12 municipalities or non-profit agencies within Alabama. In most cases, municipal governments contract with agencies specifically created to help homeless people, victims of

violence or those who face temporary situations in which they lose their place of resi-

"Emergency Solutions Grants are in many cases that last bit of rope from which those who are facing tough situations can pull themselves up to safety and go on to rebuild their lives," Ivey said. "I commend local governments and regional organizations for their participation in a program that truly helps people in a critical time in their lives.

The Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs is administering the grants from funds made available by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. ADECA administers a wide range of programs that support law enforcement, victim programs, economic development, water resource management, energy conservation and recreation.

"ADECA is pleased to be a partner in a program that gives people a helping hand and ensures they have a roof over their heads, particularly as we near the holiday season," ADECA Director Kenneth Boswell said. "ADECA joins Governor Ivey in commending the organizations whose work is so crucial to helping people facing tremendous challenges in their lives.'

Gadsden celebrates new animal barn

A little over three years since a fire at the Noccalula Falls Park petting zoo and animal barn, the City of Gadsden is celebrating the opening of a new animal barn.

City officials, park staff members and citizens gathered together on Thursday, November 7 to officially cut the ribbon on the new facility and meet some of the newest members of the park.

The new animal barn was built with a fire suppression system, according to Gadsden Mayor Craig Ford.

"The barn now has a fire suppression system in it, so [a fire] hopefully doesn't happen again," said Ford. "We also have cameras that are linked to our new fire department over at the mountain so they can see if a fire happens, they can respond quicker, so we don't have this situation occur again."

The previous barn burned to the ground in May of 2021, killing about 75 animals.

The new facility was built with funds provided by the insurance

pay-out on the previous barn's incident. A \$1.196 million bid from Bob Smith Construction was accepted in

The new habitat features alpacas, goats, miniature horses, pigs, alligators, sloths, Guinea pigs and more.

The petting zoo and animal barn is within the park at Noccalula Falls. It can be visited every day between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

In other areas at Noccalula Falls, the campground renovation and building of a new fire station are underway. Those projects are on schedule to be completed in 2025.

Built in 1905, the clubhouse is listed on the Alabama Historical Register and National Register of Historic Places and features many period pieces. She bequeathed the house to the City of Gadsden in 1990. The Gunn-Bellenger House was added to the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage in 1984 and placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1993. The house is currently under private ownership and is being renovated and restored to be used as a beautiful event space for weddings, showers or private events.

Gadsden Eye Associates' surgeon performing new procedure

Gadsden Eye Associates recently announced that Dr. Mark Hill is the second eye surgeon in Alabama to perform the iDose TR procedure, a minimally invasive, outpatient treatment that helps to lower eye pressure in patients with open-angle glaucoma or ocular hypertension (high

eye pressure).

"For those with glaucoma, preserving vision and decreasing pressure in the eyes are priority," said Hill. "The iDose TR implant offers patients continuous flow of medication to the eye without the need for routine drops with proven safety and tolerability to manage the progression of this disease."

The iDose TR implant is placed directly in the

eye through a tiny incision that is smaller than the one used for cataract surgery. This treatment is an alternative to prescription eye drops for patients. The implant is 200 times smaller than a single drop of glaucoma medication.

A leading cause of blindness and visual impairment in the U.S., Glaucoma is a progressive eve disease that damages the optic nerve due to increased eye pressure, potentially caused by infection, injury, blocked vessels or inflammation. Early-stage glaucoma often lacks symptoms, but as it advances, patients might notice peripheral vision loss, sudden eye pain, headaches, blurred vision, or halos around lights. Open-angle glaucoma is

the most common form of the disease in the U.S. and affects approximately 95 percent of individuals diagnosed with glaucoma.

Dr. Hill is a graduate of the University of Alabama School of Medicine and completed his residency in ophthalmology at the University of Alabama Eye Foundation Hospital in Birmingham. He is a member of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and serves on the Board of Directors of the Alabama Academy of Ophthalmology. Dr. Hill specializes in no-stitch cataract surgery, micro-invasive glaucoma surgery, refractive cataract surgery, eyelid surgery and the treatment of eye diseases such as glaucoma, diabetes and macular degeneration.



A marriage policy could be taken out in favor of anybody, and for that reason speculators hunted out youths who had designs on marriage and placed policies on them. If the boys married within a reasonable time period, the speculator received the benefit.

In other words, the gambler bet that a certain young man or young woman would marry. One man owned 40 such policies, while another man carried \$150,000 of the insurance. He was counting his riches in advance, as were many designing females of his acquaintance.

In 1882, The Gadsden News, owned by Payne Johnson and edited by Jehu Wellington Vandiver, began an editorial campaign against the racket by pointing out the weak foundation of the Gadsden Nuptial Association. The editorial noted the one who marries first will be paid and then the company will burst into everlasting fragments.

The first editorial of this kind caused many policy holders to realize that such a scheme could not last, and that in the long run it would explode and leave considerable financial wreckage in its wake. That is what eventually happened, although those persons behind the local company were honest and were themselves victims of a crazy idea.

The 2026 Alabama governors race is well underway

Over the past year, I've been on a speaking tour throughout the state leading up to the general election on November 5. The reason for my visiting and speaking to civic organizations was to discuss the national presidential race and its evolvement, as well as how the race for the White House affects Alabamians.

2024 was one of the most unusual, interesting and topsy-turvy presidential contests I can remember. It was entertaining, to say the least. After my talks to civic organizations, I left time for questions from the audiences. You would think that the first and most important questions would pertain to the presidential contest. However, that was not the most prevalent inquiry. In almost all 30 venues, the most-asked question was who will run for governor in 2026.

My answer is always that it will indeed be one of the most interesting and entertaining governor races in decades. With Kay Ivey unable to run for another term, there will be no incumbent. There are three obvious successors to the throne that are immediately brought to the forefront -Lieutenant Governor Will Ainsworth, Attorney General Steve Marshall and Agriculture Commissioner Rick Pate. All three must go somewhere else because all three are term-limited in their current posts.

Ainsworth, who is considered the prohibitive favorite by all Montgomery insiders, has been doing his homework and been campaigning non-stop for the governor's office for the past six years. 

"Love is who God is and what He does. He says of you, 'You are My beloved





I made up that joke one year as we sat around the Thanksgiving table. I was extremely proud of it because my father is a very creative joke teller, and I felt this one worthy of his legacy. Papa indeed was proud. He and I enjoy making up and telling jokes and stories because we get to wordsmith a bit. And to me, a "play on words" is always good for a laugh.

But my focus on words wrecked me as I worked my way towards Catholicism. The two biggest hurdles to my conversion from Protestantism were of course the Pone and Mary. My heart gradually grew to understand the "Mary stuff," but the "Pope stuff" really strained my brain. Again, it was the words that were being ascribed to the Papacy that really irked me. A quick example - when Jesus prays for Christian unity in John 17 (one my most favorite passages that truly reflects the whole purpose my writing and teaching ministry), in verse 11 Jesus calls His Father "Holy Father." Well, "Holy Father" is one of the titles for the Pope! So, this passage that calls for unity seemed to me to breed an immediate disunity. Are the Catholics doing this on purpose?

But ultimately, I was convinced of the Papacy, not by Catholics but by Scripture, by Jesus Himself.


