Etowah County issued a winter storm warning

Etowah County was issued a winter storm warning Thursday, January 9 by the National Weather Service.

The winter storm warning area begins along Interstate 20 and continues northward to Tennessee. The warning went into effect at midnight, 12 a.m., Friday morning and continues through the morning hours of Saturday.

Etowah County is also placed in a "significant impact area," which is defined as having "dangerous or impossible driving conditions." Residents are encouraged to avoid travel if possible. Widespread closures and disruptions to infrastructure "may occur."

The cause of these advisories is a winter storm named Cora. The storm is causing issues across the east region of the United States and beyond. Storm warnings and advisories on Thursday stretched from New Mexico across the country all the way to Virginia and the Carolinas.

Cora is forecast to bring between 1-3 inches of snow for Etowah County, as well as a threat of freezing rain. Ahead of the storm, schools across Etowah County

cancelled school for Friday, January 10.

Forecasters believe that travel impacts will diminish Saturday morning, as the sun warms surfaces and temperatures rise slightly. It is recommended that residents tune into local reliable sources of information, such as the Gadsden-Etowah County Emergency Management Agency.

For up-to-date information on road closures, visit ALGOtraffic.com/map. The interactive map allows individuals to see real time updates on accidents, road closures and reported travel hazards.

Apart from travel impacts, the NWS also advises that some residents may be at risk for injury by exposure to unsafe temperatures.

With the possibility of wintery precipitation and cold temperatures those without adequate sheltering and safe heat sources are at risk. Those facing homelessness, those living in homes without safe and reliable heat sources, outdoor animals and pets and those who will be working outside during the cold snap are most at risk of hypothermia and other cold temperature related dangers.

The National Weather Service (NWS) recommends that those who will be outside should wear layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing, and a hat. They also suggest staying dry and out of the wind, covering your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold and wearing mittens that are snug at the wrist.

For water pipes, it is recommended that you allow hot and cold water taps to drip or trickle when not in use. Opening cabinet doors under a sink can also help by allowing more heat into areas with uninsulated pipes. Central heating units should be left on and set for no

lower than 55 degrees. If you plan on being away from your home or business, consider shutting water off to the building or having a trusted person check on the building daily.

Meighan Bridge could soon see improvements

Southside to use state grant for new program

The City of Southside recently received a \$91,850 portion of a \$400,000 grants for law enforcement training equipment and drug treatment resources in nine counties.

Southside will use the grant money for the police department's new Virtual Reality Response Training project, in which officers take part in immersive and interactive training depicting a variety of response scenarios, including traffic stops, dealing with distressed people and handling active armed offenders.

The Limestone County Commission, the City of Muscle Shoals and the RCA Foundation also received a portion of the grant.

"Our law enforcement officers work around the clock to protect and serve our communities, and these grants will fund projects that will make conditions safer for everyone involved in law enforcement encounters, including the officers themselves," Gov. Kay Ivey said.

The grants are being awarded through the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant program, which provides funding for a wide range of endeavors including law enforcement training, technology improvement and more.

Commuters traveling to East Gadsden's retail area could enjoy a smoother ride in the future thanks to a RAISE grant for nearly \$5 million.

On Tuesday, January 7, the Gadsden City Council held a public hearing during its regularly scheduled meeting to discuss the 2025 RAISE grant project. The grant totaled \$4.6 million dollars with the city's 20 percent match equaling about \$900,000. The project would involve improving the Meighan Bridge to add additional lanes and safer sidewalks.

The city applied for the grant through the federal government, and Gadsden Mayor Craig Ford said the sidewalk improvements will allow the structure to be Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant.

Ford said that although the Meighan Bridge has passed all Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) inspections, the bridge is outdated.

"It's a six-lane highway on both ends feeding into a four-lane bridge," Ford said. "That's a problem. It does shake and it can be scary. It is safe, but it is too small."

The next stages for the city are continued planning, more grant applications for the construction portion of the project. There is no completion date or start date for the project.

"It's just the beginning planning stages," Ford said. 'We are looking ahead and trying to plan ahead for the future of Gadsden. We are growing and we need to prepare for that. We have a lot of people crossing that bridge each day.'

Judges will sample each participating chili dish to select first, second and third place cash prize winners. The public can cast their votes for the crowd favorite.

Proceeds from the event will be used to support ongoing downtown projects.





Fort named dean of GSCC Academic Programs

Dr. Chanel L. Fort has been appointed as the new dean of Academic Programs and Services. She replaces Dr. Farrah Hayes, who recently was named the director of the new Challenger Learning Center. Fort brings over two decades of diverse experience in leadership and program development to her new role at Gadsden State.

"We look forward to the positive impact Dr. Fort will make in shaping the future of our academic programs and furthering Gadsden State's mission of student success and community development," said Dr. Kathy Murphy, president of Gadsden State.

Fort holds a bachelor's degree in health sciences and health services administration from the University of Alabama at Birmingham; a master's degree in Human Services and Healthcare Administration from Capella University; and a doctoral degree in Education, Global Leadership and Change from Pepperdine University

Prior to joining Gadsden State, Fort served as the director of outcomes assessment at Jefferson State Community College, where she led the college-wide assessment and accreditation process for all four of its campuses. From 2016 to 2021, Ford was the CEO and learning strategist at Fortified Learning Solutions, an organization she founded.

Other roles Fort has held include adjunct instructor at Jefferson State, corporate dean of health sciences for Education Corporation of America and program director of Pharmacy and Office Administration Programs at Virginia College. She has also worked as a grants officer for the Alabama Department of Public Health and as a district pharmacy training coordinator and pharmacy profit-and-loss analyst for Walgreens.

In recognition of her contributions to education and her community, Fort was named to Birmingham Business Journal's "People on the Move" list in 2021 and was honored as an Education Design Lab designer in residence in 2022. As EDL designer, she was recognized as one of the 12 leaders "reimagining the role of higher education in addressing racial and economic opportunity gaps." In her role as a United Negro College Fund Institutional Change Agent for a local HBCU, Ford received \$1.1 million in funding for institutional transformation and innovation and honored as a recipient of the UNCF Change Agent Award for Academic Improvement and Transformation.

As Dean of Academic Services at Gadsden State, Fort will oversee all academic instructional programs and services, including program development and revision, library sciences, online instruction and international programs. She will also manage the Alabama Language Institute and lead the development and implementation of strategic planning for academic programs.

"I accepted the position at Gadsden State because the institution exudes excellence in education practice, operations, people power and leadership," Ford said. "Accepting the position at Gadsden State also allows me to share my wisdom in educational leadership and steer the vision of academics, which is my career passion."

Fort brings a wealth of experience in both academic leadership and community engagement with a strong track record in programmatic accreditation, institutional partnerships, grant-funded initiatives and educational improvement.

'My career has kept me at the forefront of educational practice, policy change and academic improvement,' she said. "My work in education and workforce development extends beyond the two- and four-year college systems and into city government, national accrediting organizations and national nongovernment organizations. Collectively, these experiences will catapult my work as the dean of Academic Programs and Services.'

As the new leader at Gadsden State, Fort has her sights on several immediate priorities.

'My first steps will be to conduct program reviews and evaluate the outcomes for better understanding of existing program sustainability and changing needs," she said. "I will assess faculty qualifications to ensure that all courses are taught by qualified faculty members, and I will review the library catalog of sources and close any gaps in database access, missing and expiring contracts and sources quality and library use. I will also grasp the community-based initiatives offered through the Alabama Language Institute, the Teaching and Learning Center and the Fine Arts Division. It is also important that I understand the historical impact of the college's international program to develop a concise vision for recharging the college's global awareness."

Fort's approach to leadership emphasizes relationship building and collaboration.

"I plan to meet with the faculty, staff and students through focus groups to gather insights on professional development interests and morale and student perspectives on academic support systems," she said. "Additionally, I intend to establish meaningful relationships and inculcate leadership as a circle of support."

Gadsden State Community College hosted a free training session for Behavioral Intervention Threat Assessment Teams, law enforcement professionals and school personnel on Thursday, January 9.

The four-hour course hosted at Gadsden State's Gadsden campus's science building's auditorium provided insights and strategies for enhancing safety and preparedness in schools and communities

In case a pipe does freeze and rupture, it is recommended by NWS to make sure everyone capable of doing so know how to turn off the water to the building. NWS also warns to never thaw pipes with an open flame or torch. A hair dryer is recommended.

Another danger of cold weather comes from unsafe attempts at heating surroundings. Using kerosene heaters and other natural gas heaters can release dangerous levels of carbon monoxide. If using those heating methods, it is recommended that a carbon monoxide detector is installed. Other tips include opening a window slightly, closing off rooms that do not need immediate heat.

Residents are urged to never use a gas oven as a means of heating your home, never use a generator indoors, never use gasoline to light your fireplace and never burn charcoal indoors.

Residents are encouraged to bring all pets inside, if possible, and check on neighbors who may not have reliable heat

NWS also recommends preparing your vehicle for cold weather by checking your battery, check your fluids, check the air in your tires and ensure that they are staying aired up, placing jumper cables in your car and placing a blanket and warm back up clothes in your vehicle, in case it breaks down.




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

Bob Leath was one of Gadsden's finest detectives



Walter Pryor was the only person ever Gadsden on North Third Street. The building was abandoned when the new courtsey

Pryor was employed by the Alabama charge of labor.

Pryor, who lived in camp quarters on the premises, did not show up for work one morning, and Quest went to his room to wake him up. A woman was in Pryor's quarters, which was against the rules. When Quest told her leave the premises, Pryor pulled a pistol and shot him. When Pryor escaped, the employees of the construction company offered a \$300 reward for his capture.

Company officials requested that Gadsden Police Chief Bob Leath direct the man hanged in the old county jail in downtown hunt for Pryor, although the crime occurred outside the city limits. Leath agreed and set about to hunt the fugitive. The chief house was completed. Pryor had shot and got many leads, false and otherwise, and fikilled Henry Quest, a man from New Jer- nally located Pryor in Calhoun County near Duke Station.

Leath solicited the aid of Gadsden po-Power Construction Company, which was liceman Morris Roper and Bill Thornton, building the first steam plant of the Ala- and the trio soon laid the trap for the capbama Power Company in East Gadsden ture. In order to prevent premature publicin 1913. Quest was the personnel man in ity, Leath kept a local reporter informed of every step he would make.

When everything was ready, Leath, Roper and Thornton found Pryor hiding in the smokehouse of John Lawrence, a local farmer who had agreed to feed Pryor and give him a suit of clothes in exchange for the pistol that was used in the Quest killing. Pryor surrendered without any resistance. Every cent of the \$300 reward was paid to Lawrence.

On Aug. 19, 1913, after Pryor had been jailed, the employees at the power station presented Leath with a fine Hamilton watch with 21 ruby jewels and bore an engraved inscription showing that it had been presented to him as an appreciation of his fine work. Later that night Leath was the guest of honor at a dinner given by Alabama Power Construction Company employees as a further mark of their appreciation.

Pryor was given a fair trial and sentenced to hang. His case went to Alabama Supreme Court, but there were no mitigating circumstances in his favor.

Pryor never showed the least sign of re-

gret or repentance and would not talk to anybody about the incident.

The Pryor case was only one of many successful detective jobs Leath pulled off in his many years as a peace officer in Etowah County. He served three terms as Etowah County sheriff and built a solid record in solving major crimes, including running down the notorious the bank robber Tom Barnes.

As of Jan. 18, 1950, all prisoners were moved out of the old county jail and locked up in the new Etowah County Courthouse building located at Eighth Street and Forrest Avenue.

Hanging was abolished as a means of capital punishment in Alabama by a bill sponsored by J.C. Inzer of Gadsden when he was a member of the state legislature. Inzer's bill called for all executions to take place in an electric chair at a state prison. Since that law went into effect, all death sentences have been carried out in Montgomery.

My maternal grandmother would have turned 100 on January 8. Memaw grew up in the deep South and had the accent to prove it. It is safe to say that she could have done a voiceover for Governor Ivey's "high stepper" advertisement and nobody would have known the difference. Memaw knew how to draw out those one-syllable words and knew exactly how to use the phrase "bless your heart!"

My birthday is also in January, along with my uncle, Memaw's son. It was customary for Memaw to make a yellow cake with homemade fudge icing for the three of us, which she would garnish with pecan (pronounced /puh-KAHN/) halves in concentric circles around the top of her twolayer delicacy. It is a tradition I have missed now for almost 19 years since she went to Gloryland. I have tried to make the cake the same way she did but nobody makes it like Memaw did. There is just something about the memories of our grandmothers' cooking that live on in our hearts as legend, which few too many times, she dusted her counreminds me of a story that I have never shared publicly until now.

It happened right after my sister was married in 1993. She was a young bride all set to make her husband a delicious breakfast for dinner. She had never really cooked much, except for the occasional Kraft macand-cheese that college life afforded, but how hard could it be?

My sister first laid out her ingredients and started mixing the biscuits. Following the recipe on the back of the all-purpose flour package, she decided to call Memaw for support.

"Hey dahlin'," Memaw's excited voice said when she heard my sister's greeting (in proper Southern dialect, the "r" sound is not pronounced). "Whatcha doin'?

"I am cooking breakfast for dinner tonight and I need your help," my sister replied. "The recipe calls for baking soda and baking powder, but I don't have any powder."

"Honey, just put a little extra soda. It'll be fine.³

Sister opened the freezer and grabbed the opened box of baking soda that she had stored in there (you know, the one that is supposed to absorb the odor). She measured out two teaspoons and tossed it in the mix Next Memaw told her to cut

ter with flour and rolled the dough. With no biscuit cutter, she grabbed a glass and cut her biscuits like she had seen Momma do, placed them on the pan and popped them in the oven. Easy-peasy, she thought.

Next up were the grits. With Memaw still on the phone, Sister set the water to boil and measured out the amounts Memaw told her to use while trying to follow along with the printed instructions.

Sister looked over all of the directions. Puzzled, she interrupted Memaw to ask about one more ingredient.

"Memaw, the box says 'yield: two cups." What's yield?"

'Oh, I don't know, dahlin'. I always leave that out of mine.'

With that, Sister dumped the dry grits into the boiling water and let Memaw get back to her day. "Love you," said Memaw. 'Call me anytime!'

Sister turned the grits to simmer, then fried up the bacon and scrambled the eggs. By now, the biscuit timer had sounded. She opened the oven door to reveal a very oddly yellow batch of biscuits, which she placed on the counter to cool. "That's weird," she thought.

As the biscuits cooled, Sister barely got a knife through the tough exterior to slide a pat of butter inside. She was devastated.

God's great gift of unspoken prayer


Many church youth programs were bursting at the seams in the 1990s. My Baptist church had a fun and exciting youth group. Because of that, we were well-supported and offered many opportunities for youth worship services, beach retreats, mountain retreats and mission trips. Occasionally, our youth minister would make us attend the Wednesday night adult prayer meeting instead of our usual youth group.

I found those adult meetings extremely boring and often depressing, what with so many prayer requests by old and sick people about old and sick people things (in other words, health issues). Occasionally there were prayer requests related to house fires, deaths car accidents, or crimes. Very rarely were there specific "spiritual need" type of prayer requests, such as a lost family member, a fallen away Christian or a struggling marriage. These prayer requests were fewer in number because these were deeply personal. If careless, these requests could be construed as gossip or become hurtful in another way. I myself became nervous at times in thinking someone might expose my sin or the struggles of my family in a public way. However, it seemed like the most common prayer request was "unspoken." Many church members would raise their hand and simply say, "I have an unspoken prayer request," and others would nod with what looked like real understanding. In my inexperienced youth, it seemed to me that listing a million unspoken prayer requests was a waste of time. Now that I'm older, in know that the unspoken prayer is where the real battle of faith is fought. Psalm 25:7 says, "Remember not the sins of my youth, or my transgressions." Now that I'm Catholic, there is a different process for the same kind of "prayer meeting." Early in each Mass at St. James Catholic Church, Father Jose Chacko will

announce something to the effect of, "I am offering this Mass for the intentions of the [fill in name] family." It is sometimes it is for the intentions of the Pope or the repose of the soul of a recently deceased parish member or for safe elections and a peaceful transition of power or in honor of someone's birthday. But oftentimes Father Chacko looks at the congregation and soberly says, "I'm offering this Mass for your intentions."

This prayer request hits me deeply every time I hear it, for I, like you, carry very heavy unspoken prayers. To know that Jesus Christ, who is present to us in the Eucharist and present in the room with us, will hear my prayer right here and now. Yes, the prayer that I keep silent between me, and the world will be fully exchanged between me and Jesus Christ. Yes, the One who hears the whole world cry is about to hear my own heart cry.


Father Chacko pauses for a time of silence, in order for us to begin the battle for faith in the unspoken prayer, such as "Lord, I don't know how to survive my parent's dementia," or "Lord, I feel the desperate call of my past addiction craving my soul," or "Lord, my child may be under demonic oppression, please save them," or "Lord, our finances are a shambles, help us find a way out," or "Lord, it's all my fault and I no longer want to live," or "Lord, the cancer has returned, and I'm losing hope." Yes, these heaviest and most personal of prayers are mingled within the "Prayer of the Church." These massive unspoken prayers find their place in the Mass, in Jesus' midst and before His "throne of grace" (Hebrews 4:16).





Carpenter pointed to his team's depth as a major factor.

We had a lot of guys who came off the bench tonight and stepped up for us. We're limited in numbers, so everybody has to be ready to play when called upon. We have faith that every guy who steps out on the court will do what we ask him to do."

The Bulldogs' balanced scoring attack included 19 points form Parker Smith, 18 from J.B. Potter, 16 from Dalton Rice-Thompson, 12 from Jrey Colley 11 from Nate Huckbay and nine from Dylan Palmer.
