The event introduces young leaders to engage in the legislative process, develop public speaking skills and collaborate on real-world issues. "Most of them had no idea what they had signed up for, and within minutes of the start of the conference, I noticed our students were lined up to run for officer positions and debate on the floor. 

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

The demise of *The Magnolia* and downtown horse trading



In May 1883, the steamer Magnolia, widely considered as the finest boat ever to ply the Coosa River, was declared unfit for further service. Badly damaged when stripped of its machinery and the hull was used for a barge, which eventually sank in Hokes Bluff and went down with a large amount of pig iron on board.

father owned the boat, displayed The Mag-Little Wills Valley located near Reece City. hibit their animals.

The Magnolia, which was operational for about 12 years, featured a sharp prow, or model bow, and two smokestacks. It contained several state rooms, a lounge and a parlor. As a result, it performed a good deal of passenger business.

The boat also carried the U.S. Mail and handled a good deal of freight, including cotton. The Magnolia made it through the first government lock shortly it was completed below Greensport in St. Clair County.

In June of 1880, a notice was issued that a horse swappers convention would be held in the front of the Etowah County Courthouse in Gadsden. The notice read, "All horse it sank near Cedar Bluff, the boat was swappers, mule traders, equine fanciers, donkey dealers, steer drivers, etc., are invited."

Built in 1870, the courthouse sat back where the annex once stood. Part of the front of the building was used for hitching posts. By stepping out of our comfort zones and embracing life's adventures, we open ourselves up to a world of possibilities. We meet new people, discover new passions and create memories that we'll cherish forever. It's these experiences that truly enrich our lives and give us stories to tell.

So, the next time you find yourself lying in bed while scrolling through your phone or daydreaming about the future, remember W.C. Fields' cheeky wisdom. Ask yourself what you might be missing out on by staying in bed, and challenge yourself to get up and explore what the world has to offer. And always remember that YOU have something to offer, too.

When I was a little girl, Gadsden looked a lot different than it does now. I like to think about all the ways I've seen it change through the years, in a "wow, things have really changed and it is cool I've gotten to watch it happen" kind of way. I think that is one of the best parts of coming back to your childhood hometown and creating a

My girls will often roll their eyes and recite the things I point out in unison with me — to let me know I am boring them. But I will most likely continue to point things out because I want them to be observant and have similar memories once they are

I remember when Noccalula Falls was a wide-open space, without fences around the outer boundaries. Back then, there was a fenced-in area with a big buck and several deer. I loved watching those deer. I also loved seeing the lion when I was little. Today, the park may have more fencing, but I love seeing all the work that has gone into updating and adding value to it. We are really blessed to have such a gorgeous natural space in our city, and our family has always loved visiting the animals, riding the train and playing in the playground.

That playground is another major improvement. When I was a little girl, it was full of death traps. The one trap that friends and I laugh about the most was the stand up merry-go-round that had small foot platforms to step onto, tiny handles at shoulder height to grab and a slightly hollowed out space to press your belly against. Once everyone else was in position, one kid would start running and then hop on and we'd all close our eyes tight and hang on for dear

Another popular playground attraction back then was the wooden wheel. It was large enough for several children — and teens — to climb into then run in like hamsters. Some of us would run to turn it, others would stand with arms and legs spread out, propping themselves against the centrifugal force. Eventually, someone would trip and fall, tumbling around like a sock in a dryer, and we'd all fall. It was always fun until someone broke an arm or leg or was elbowed in the eve.

Shortly after our high school class had senior pictures made at the Falls, both of those rides were removed and new playground equipment was installed. As a teenager, I thought that was sad. As a mom, I'm grateful for safer options on the playground, and I have enjoyed the beauty that the improvements have given us in the park

Last week, I drove all the way down For-

rest Avenue for the first time in a while. It reminded me of how much has changed there, too, since I was a little girl. When I was about 8, my dad would sometimes take my sister and me to the flea market on Forrest Avenue, a block or two down from the Forrest Cemetery. She and I would look around at all the treasures that each stall, table or vehicle offered, and often came home with a prize. One vivid memory I have from those trips is of the sunrise shining through bottles of Watkins flavorings, turning the contents into what looked like sparkling red, green or yellow jewels.

That road was also home to the Humane Society when I was young. I remember going to pet the animals and even bringing home a pet a few times. That building is gone now, and that space is used for something else entirely, but when I drive past, I am amazed by how our brains can overlay what we see in the present with what we remember from the past.

Yesterday, I missed my turn and drove down South 11th Street. When I realized my mistake, I turned around at the bird walk, and then drove down one of the roads in the historic district. I was not in a hurry, and the girls and I found our way back to where I was supposed to be. As I pointed out the playground we used to walk to when



I was little, the house where I took ballet for many years and other places that have changed in the past few decades, I decided I need to meander through town with the girls more often so they will have these "I remember when..." moments one day, too.

Choosing healthy beverages

Choosing healthy beverages for children and adolescents is just as important as choosing healthy foods, as it impacts everything from oral health to chronic disease risk. That's why leading health and nutrition organizations developed new healthy beverage recommendations for families with children ages 5-18.

These evidence-based recommendations were created as part of a collaboration by experts at the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry, American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Heart Association, which were brought together by Healthy Eating Research (HER) with funding from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

To make choosing healthy beverages easier for families, the organizations created these three categories:

Beverages to drink

These beverages are recommended as part of a healthy diet because they provide essential nutrients such as vitamins and minerals and don't contain added sugars.

• Plain drinking water is still the best option to keep kids healthy and hydrated. It's also often the most accessible and affordable.

• Plain, pasteurized milk is another healthy option because it provides important nutrients that growing kids and teens need.

Beverages to limit

• 100 percent fruit and vegetable juice can be part of a healthy diet, but daily consumption should be limited. Whole fruits and vegetables are generally better choices because they provide dietary fiber, contributing to a feeling of fullness.

• Plant-based milk alternatives like oat milk and almond milk should be limited because they are not nutritionally equivalent to cow's milk, which provides essential nutrients that kids need to grow up healthy. Many also contain added sugars and non-sugar sweeteners, which are harmful to kids' health. If your child is allergic to dairy milk or has a dietary restriction, about finding the plant-based milk alternative that is best for your child.

• Flavored milks, like chocolate milk and strawberry milk, should be limited because they contain high amounts of added sugars and non-sugar sweeteners. If your child does not like drinking plain milk, it's best to consider other foods from the dairy group (like unsweetened yogurt) before offering flavored milk.

Beverages to avoid

These beverages are not recommended as part of a healthy diet because they offer no nutritional value and have ingredients that can be harmful to kids and teens.

• Sugar-sweetened beverages, such as sports drinks, sodas, fruit drinks, fruitades, aguas frescas and sweetened waters are high in added sugars, which can put children at risk for dental cavities, and dietrelated diseases like type 2 diabetes and

• Drinks with non-sugar sweeteners, such as aspartame, stevia and monk fruit, should also be avoided. Just because a drink is advertised as sugar-free doesn't mean it's healthier. In fact, new research shows non-sugar sweeteners may not help control body weight and may increase the risk of diet-related chronic diseases such as type 2 diabetes and heart disease.

· Drinks with caffeine or other stimulants like taurine should be avoided. These include energy drinks, energy shots, coffee, and tea. Evidence suggests that there is no safe amount of caffeine consumption for children under 18 and that even small amounts can lead to poor sleep quality, increased blood pressure, and depressive moods and anxiety.

Four creatures small and wise



The Book of Proverbs is often referred to as "the book of wisdom." Filled with Biblical insights, Proverbs addresses questions about values, moral behavior, the meaning of human life and righteous conduct. King Solomon, recognized as the wisest, wealthiest and most powerful man in history, authored 29 of the 31 chapters in this book. Chapter 30 was written by a man named Agur, whose name means "collector," while chapter 31 was penned by King Lemuel.

In Proverbs 30, Agur shares a collection of wise savings. In verses 24-28, he illustrates wisdom by using four of the smallest creatures on earth. These animals and the lessons they convey about wisdom remain relevant even today.

Proverbs 30:24-28 (Passion Translation) very small but very wise: the feeble ant has little strength yet look how it diligently gathers its food in the summer to last throughout the winter. The delicate rock- is that they know where their security lies.

badger is not all that strong, yet look how it makes a secure home, nestled in the rocks. The locusts have no king to lead them, yet they cooperate as they move forward by bands. And the small lizard is easy to catch as it clings to the walls with its hands, yet it can be found inside a king's palace.

In Proverbs 30, Agur's treasure of wise sayings reveals profound truths. In verses 24-28, he highlights four of the smallest creatures on earth as remarkable illustrations of wisdom. These tiny beings, timeless in their lessons, inspire us to appreciate the profound simplicity of nature's teachings. The lessons Agur shares from these creatures is still applicable for us today. Let's look at each one.

The ant. This creature, although extremely small and with little strength, stores up its food in the summer in preparation for winter. The ant prepares ahead and works today for tomorrow. How should we be preparing spiritually, emotionally, financially and physically for the seasons ahead? Wisdom is working today in preparation for tomorrow.

The Rock Badger. This creature is a bit larger than a prairie dog, about the size of a groundhog. They are usually gray, the color of the rocks, which makes them very says, "The earth has four creatures that are hard to see when they are sunning on a rock. When predators come, the rock badger runs into the crag or hole of a rock for protection. One thing about rock badgers

A rock badger knows that when it wanders away from the rock, it becomes vulnerable to the enemy. Is our security in the Lord or in things of this world? Wisdom is daily placing my security in the Lord and letting Him be my protection.

The locust. This creature is not very powerful alone. However, the locust knows that its power comes from being in community with other locusts. When that occurs, they are able to topple kingdoms (Revelation 9). Are we engaged and active with a community of believers? Wisdom is realizing our need for community and being active within that community.

The lizard. This creature "is easy to catch, yet it can be found inside a king's palace." Lizards are small, slippery and not the most beautiful of creatures, yet they can be found in the presence of the king. Although there is an incongruity to this picture, the lizard represents grace. Grace is often incongruous or out of place. Where do we need to have more grace towards a person or a situation? Wisdom is seeing others through the lenses of God's grace.

Lord, we ask You to help us learn and apply the lessons on wisdom that we have learned from the ant, rock badger, locust and lizard. Thank You for these truths that never change!



The highest of all ceremony

I recently watched a video highlighting the pomp and precision of The Changing of The Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. With awe, I witnessed the carefully choreographed process by which the solider and his weapon are inspected at the changeout. Every item of the soldier's uniform is examined - every crease must be to perfection and every hem must look impeccable. The solider must be fit to be presentable at all times and at the very highest level, and his weapon is examined from every angle and wiped with white gloves on every surface. Not a speck of dust is allowed. Why?

There is one unknown World War 1 soldier buried at Arlington National Cemetery, but the significance of this memorial is so much more profound than just the one unidentified soldier. There have been so very many soldiers lost to war, and because of the horrors of war, there are many unknown dead soldiers. Though the tomb is specifically reserved for only one unknown soldier, this special place represents all those who have been lost and not properly mourned. Since this place represents so much, it is treated with the upmost reverence, including a posted guard who stands at the ready, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year, in order to honor that fallen brother and encourage all visitors to never forget. But I ask again, why?

It is human nature to attach ceremony to everything we deem important. It can be as silly as singing Happy Birthday with a huge sombrero on one's head at a local restaurant or as grand as the opening ceremonies at the Olympics.

Meaningful events are always adorned

with ritual. At school graduations, we don our caps and gowns, receive our diplomas and ceremoniously move our tassels. Things are much more grandiose at weddings, where so much meaning stands behind the symbolism of the white dress, the father handing over a bride, the exchange of rings and vows to God being witnessed by the priest and attested to by the public. 
Girls basketball

The Coosa Christian senior was recognized as one of three finalists for the 2024 Class 2A Lineman of the Year finalist at the Alabama Sports Writers Association's Mr. Football banquet on Tuesday, Jan. 28 in Montgomery.

In nine games this past season at line-backer, O'Bryant finished with 125 tackles, including 25 for a loss, while helping Coosa Christian post a 9-1 record on the field. He recorded his 500th career tackles this past season for 13th on the AHSAA all-time career tackle list. O'Bryant was named to the ASWA first-team Class 2A All-State first team and was selected as the Player of the Yar for the All-Messenger football team.



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

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
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
